

**MINUTES OF THE 90TH SPRING MEETING OF THE AAVSO,
HELD MAY 3–6, 2001, MADISON, WISCONSIN**

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The Finance Committee met on Thursday morning, May 3, and the AAVSO Council met that afternoon at the Crowne Plaza Hotel.

On Friday, May 4, many members attended an Eclipsing Binary Workshop conducted by Dr. Dirk Terrell of the Southwest Research Institute, Boulder, Colorado. Late in the afternoon, members and guests were transported to the Yerkes Observatory, where director-designate Kyle Cudworth demonstrated the historic 40-inch refractor and members of the Milwaukee Astronomical Society hosted a cook-out with traditional Wisconsin fare.

On Saturday, May 5, the Membership Meeting was called to order at 8:58 a.m. by President Lee Anne Willson. Before the start of business, attendees were shown a CCD image of Minor Planet 11695 Mattei taken by the collaborative team of AAVSO CCD observers Bill Dillon, Arne Henden, Dan Kaiser, Mario Motta, Aaron Price, and Chuck Pullen.

David Williams read the Minutes of the 89th Annual Meeting prepared by Secretary Martha Hazen, who could not be present. The Minutes were accepted with minor correction.

Director Janet Mattei read a report by Past Treasurer Ted Wales, prepared on behalf of Treasurer Wayne Lowder. During the past year, the AAVSO has reduced its holdings of common stocks and replaced them with bonds. This portfolio adjustment has mitigated the effects of the recent stock market decline and increased income by \$60,000. During the reporting period, expenses have exceeded income, but the difference is less than the increased value of our assets. The Treasurer's Report was accepted as read.

During his report, AAVSO Photoelectric Photometry Committee Chairman Howard Landis announced that, having reached the age of 80 years and having served as chairman for 25 years, he would be retiring effective with the Annual Meeting in November. The members recognized this record of service to the AAVSO with an enthusiastic ovation.

Director Janet Mattei reported that the Council had approved the applications of 73 new members. She also reported the deaths of four long-time members or friends of the AAVSO, George Alcock, Fred Cederblom, Eugene Gale, and Leland Price. The members rose for a moment of silent tribute to these colleagues.

Director Mattei then presented her semi-annual report. Some of the highlights of a very active and successful period included the addition of the 10 millionth observation to the AAVSO International Database, the publication of the *AAVSO Manual for Visual Observing of Variable Stars* (the first revision in many years), production of a CD-ROM of all AAVSO charts, further streamlining and automation of incoming observations, automation of the chart-making process, upgrades and improvements to the web site, a record high number of requests for data, and grants received from NASA, the Fund for Astrophysical Research, and the Curry Foundation.

During her report, the Director took the opportunity to acknowledge the presence of two of the AAVSO's youngest observers, Michael Weier, aged 12, and Angie Manske, aged 9, as well as Miriam Houston, widow of long-time member and Councilor Walter Scott Houston.

The Director announced that the 90th Annual Meeting will be held in Waltham, Massachusetts, November 1–3, 2001, and the 91st Spring Meeting—the AAVSO Pan-Pacific Meeting—will be held in Waikoloa (near Kona on the Big Island of Hawaii), June 30–July 6, 2002.

At the suggestion of member Paul Norris, steps are being taken to obtain a special commemorative postal cancellation to honor the 90th anniversary of the AAVSO at the Annual Meeting in November.

President Willson announced that AAVSO officers and Councilors would conduct a brainstorming session with several professional astronomers for a day and a half on Monday and Tuesday, May 7 and 8. The theme would be the impact of the changing landscape of astronomy on the AAVSO, with consideration of such developments as the proposed National Virtual Observatory, the trend toward massive surveys and less access to telescopes for astronomers, new NASA missions, and new ground-based telescopes.

The Membership Meeting was adjourned at noon for a group photo.

The Scientific Paper Session was called to order at 1:32 p.m. A total of 12 oral and 2 poster papers were presented (see list).

The banquet was held that evening. Following dinner, Observer Awards were presented to recognize those members who had achieved specified milestones in visual, photoelectric, or CCD observing. The recipient of the 2001 Director's Award was announced as Stephen D. O'Connor for his untiring contributions to both special and general AAVSO observing programs. At Steve's request the award will

be presented to him at the 90th Annual Meeting. To conclude the evening, Dr. Christopher M. Anderson, chairman of the Astronomy Department at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, gave an illustrated talk on the South Africa Large Telescope (SALT) project.

On Sunday morning, the Milwaukee Astronomical Society Observatory, which houses several telescopes, was opened for a visit.

On Monday, May 7, AAVSO Council members and several invited professional experts met from 9:00 am until well into the evening to discuss the landscape of Astronomy in the New Century and the role of the AAVSO in this landscape. Jay Gallagher (University of Wisconsin) reported on development trends in ground-based astronomy. Steve Beckwith (Space Telescope Science Institute) reported on future directions in space-based astronomy. John Good (California Institute of Technology, Infrared Processing and Analysis Center) discussed astronomical databases, the proposed National Virtual Observatory, and the AAVSO's potential role in it. Arne Henden (U. S. Naval Observatory) reported on surveys and automatic telescopes, and Janet Mattei (AAVSO) discussed the current roles and strengths of the AAVSO. Participants then separated into working groups to discuss these developments and identify challenges and opportunities for the AAVSO in the years ahead. The working groups presented their reports the next morning, and following extensive discussions, the session was concluded at noon.
